Senate Afterschool Caucus Highlights Contributions of Quality Rural Afterschool and Summer Learning Programs

Briefing Will Explore Strategies for Student Engagement, Community Development and Family Support

Afterschool programs in rural communities help children in places where prospects and resources can be limited. In many rural areas, afterschool programs are the only source of supplemental enrichment in literacy, nutrition education, technology, and preparation for college. Afterschool programs offer effective and affordable ways to overcome obstacles confronting rural communities and help students realize their full potential.

At a congressional briefing, a panel of education experts leading strong school-community partnerships in Iowa, West Virginia and Minnesota will discuss how afterschool programs in rural communities foster student and family engagement and community development.
