

## Afterschool in Iowa


The need or demand for afterschool among the 518,951 school-age children in Iowa:

- 32% (166,583) of Iowa's K-12 children are responsible for taking care of themselves after school.
- 11% (58,123) of Iowa's K-12 children participate in afterschool programs.
- 35% (161,290) of all children not in afterschool would be likely to participate **IF** an afterschool program were available. [Afterschool Alliance, *America After 3 PM*, 2009]

Current funding for 21<sup>st</sup> Century Community Learning Centers and Child Care and Development Block Grant is not meeting the need:

**In Iowa, 21**<sup>st</sup> **Century Community Learning Centers (21**<sup>st</sup> **CCLC),** the only federal program dedicated to afterschool, provides funds for afterschool programs that serve primarily Title I students. Eligible applicants include schools, community-based organizations, and public, private, or faith-based organizations. A total of 20 grantees serve 51 afterschool centers with students from 106 feeder schools. In its last competition, the 21<sup>st</sup> CCLC program awarded only 5 grants out of a total of 25 applicants.

Child Care and Development Block Grant (CCDBG) provides vouchers or subsidies for low-income parents to pay for childcare, including preschool, before-school, afterschool and summer care for schoolage children (ages 5-12). CCDBG had been level-funded until 2009, when the *American Reinvestment and Recovery Act* brought an increase in funding and Iowa qualified for \$18,120,842. CCDGB was level-funded again in 2010, but for FY11, President Obama proposed a \$1.6 billion national increase to CCDBG, which will help to improve the availability of school-age care across the country. However, even with the President's proposed increase, further investments in this federal funding source will be necessary to promote access to quality afterschool programs.
